<u>Subject</u>: Urgent need for arrest warrants to prevent the continuing commission by Israeli officials of genocide, crimes against humanity and war crimes against Palestinians [regarding Investigation into the Situation in the State of Palestine (ICC-01/18)]

Human rights groups worldwide support Palestinian human rights organizations and demand that arrest warrants be immediately issued

Dear Prosecutor Khan,

The undersigned group of human rights organizations and social movements across the world write to you in support of Al-Haq, Al Mezan Center for Human Rights, and the Palestinian Centre for Human Rights. On Wednesday, 8 November, the three Palestinian human rights organizations submitted a legal filing before the International Criminal Court (ICC) calling for "urgent attention to:

- the continuous barrage of Israeli airstrikes on densely populated civilian areas within the Gaza Strip,
- the suffocating siege imposed on this territory,
- the forced displacement of its population,
- the use of toxic gas, and
- the denial of necessities, such as food, water, fuel, and electricity."

We echo the demand for your immediate action necessary to prevent the continuing commission of these modes of the crimes of genocide, incitement to genocide, crimes against humanity --including apartheid--and war crimes, such as indiscriminate destruction of Palestinian homes and fundamental public services, including schools and hospitals, via seeking arrest warrants from the ICC Pre-Trial Chamber for officials at the helm of the Israeli military and other relevant forces and personnel: President Isaac Herzog, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Defence Minister Yoav Gallant. The legal filing of Al Haq, Al Mezan, and the Palestinian Centre for Human Rights details the commission of these crimes and how they are ongoing, substantiating the need for arrest warrants under Article



58(1)(b)(3) of the Rome Statute. We also urge you to plead with State Parties to adequately fund the investigation and ensure timely and effective access to justice.

We note the <u>referral</u> of the Situation in Palestine by five States Parties to the Rome Statute on 17th November, requesting the Prosecutor to "vigorously investigate" crimes related to Israel's settlement regime, in particular, policies, laws and official decisions, the crimes against humanity of persecution and apartheid, and genocide, amongst others. In addition, the recent financial contributions of Ireland and Belgium in consideration of the investigation into the Situation in Palestine, place ample resources before the Office of the Prosecutor to immediately proceed.

As a global network working to advance economic, social, cultural, and environmental rights, interdependently and indivisibly with all human rights, including the right to life, ESCR-Net condemns the widespread and systematic killing of civilians in the Gaza Strip (and elsewhere across the occupied Palestinian territory) – at least 16,248 Palestinians were killed in Gaza between 7 October and 5 December, 70 percent of whom are said to be women and children. Reports indicate that at least 100 people were killed on 6 December alone according to the United Nations. Many, possibly thousands, remain unidentified, stuck under rubble, killed or injured through relentless bombings and military strikes from air, land and sea for the past 40 days, much of which targeted civilians, civilian objects and infrastructure. Israeli government and military have repeatedly made their intent clear: large-scale destruction, full siege, forcible displacement and transfer of more than 1.5 million Palestinians, using starvation as a mean of warfare while denying other basic needs, including water, medicine and medical care supplies such as fuel for hospitals, shelter, sanitation, public utilities, among others.

We recognize the significant role that ICC arrest warrants could play a significant role in deterring these ongoing violations and crimes by Israeli officials. The failure to issue arrest warrants for cases identified in the initial stages of the investigation is entrenching the impunity that is fueling Israeli occupation with open disregard for the rule of law. Action by the ICC would also have a significant impact on other States by reaffirming legal obligations to prevent crimes and deter further conduct that may amount to aiding and abetting, such as the United States' substantial military, intelligence and diplomatic support as well as military support by the UK, the Netherlands and Canada.

We note your <u>statement</u> on 6 December where you emphasized "the imperative that humanitarian relief be allowed into Gaza immediately and at scale" and "that wilfully impeding relief supplies to civilians may constitute a war crime under the ICC Rome statute." Israel continues to impede access to humanitarian relief and it is evident that words of deterrence are not enough. Arrest warrants must be issued immediately.

The Court must act now to hold Israeli officials and complicit actors accountable, lest it undermine the pillars of the rule of international law.
